

Andrew Massey is Professor of Public Administration, Department of Politics, University of Exeter. Prior to this he was an Associate Dean at the University of Portsmouth and has taught at the Universities of London (Queen Mary College) and Salford.

He was awarded a MSC by the LSE and a PhD by Queen Mary College, both University of London.

He is the leader on the Masters in Public Administration (MPA) degree in the Department of Politics and researches on public sector reform and modernization.

He is the author of numerous books and articles on these subjects including:

In September 2001 he addressed the United Nations General Assembly, New York on the future of Public Administration and has just co-authored an international report to be presented to the UN on global governance and the need to establish a global public service.

He has also produced reports for and advised the British Cabinet Office and HM Treasury as well as the National Audit Office. He regularly contributes to the work of the Public Management and Policy Association and has been the Chair of the UK's Joint University Council.

He has Chaired the Public Administration Specialist Group of the UK's Political Studies Association and in 2008 was elected an Academician of the UK's Academy of Social Sciences in recognition of his national and international work in the social sciences.
